Message from the Manse

This month of May will have a very different feel to it for me. Not only is it my turn to attend the General Assembly but I will be attending two National Assessment Conferences in my role as a Church Assessor for recruitment to ministry.

The need for more minsters to lead congregations and their recruitment especially amongst younger members of the church will be a major part of the Assembly's work this year. Similarly, a report on Inter Faith engagement will promote understanding and respect for how the church sees itself in relation to other faith groups, and how faith itself is seen and valued in society.

There is no doubt that in our fast changing technological world, we are facing rapid change in how people relate to each other and to the institutions which have for centuries been the bedrock of our society. On the one hand we can see the decline in church attendance as making us a less "Christian" country, whilst on the other the fact that as a whole people still value justice, democracy, love for neighbour and laws based on ten commandments suggests we are neither as unspiritual or irreligious as the media would have us believe.

How the church as a national institutions draws together individual Christians and congregations which have a breadth of theological understanding of what it means to love God and to live as disciples of Jesus is a question that will dominate not just the Assembly's thinking but our whole church's practice in the year ahead and for

years to come and we have our part to play in that discussion as we worship and share our faith together week by week.

It is the love we display, the faith that is revealed in our actions, which draws others to Christ.


Side by Side

An Unprecedented Situation

Under Unique circumstances, the Rev John Chalmers has been named the Moderator-Designate of the 2014 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

He was nominated on April 2, a little over a fortnight after the withdrawal for health reasons of the Rev Dr Angus Morrison.

Mr Chalmers, from Dunfermline, is currently the Principal Clerk to the General Assembly.



Following his nomination, he said it was 'an unexpected privilege and a real honour' and that he would 'seek above all else to hold the people of the Church of Scotland together in peace and unity'.

"My focus will be on those things that unite us," he said. "Within the Church we have to learn to live with our differences. We have an urgent need to recruit women and men to train to be ministers and it's time to let society know that there is something very meaningful about living the life of faith.

"Women and men of Christian faith have motives, values and a sense of meaning that should be among the life choices which are seriously discussed in the public square."

Born in Bothwell, South Lanarkshire, Mr Chalmers trained for the ministry at Trinity College, Glasgow, and served

as a parish minister in Dumbartonshire and Edinburgh between 1979 and 1995.

After that he worked in the Church's Board of Ministry and its successor, the Ministries Council, until becoming Principal Clerk in 2010. He was appointed a Chaplain to the Queen in Scotland last year.

His older sister, June had Down's Syndrome, and he has spent most of his life supporting the work of disabilities charity Enable. For 20 years he was also a member of the board of Donaldson's, the National School for the Deaf. He said that during the year he hoped to visit many special needs facilities, because he believes that some of the greatest works of service are done by people who do not get enough affirmation or public recognition.

He also promised to 'champion the right of the most disadvantaged both at home and abroad'.

"I will want to tell the story of a Church which cares about the values by which Scotland lives, which cares about the conditions in which people live and which puts its money where its faith is, in the work it does amongst the most vulnerable and marginalised," he added.

In 2011 his youngest son John-James was seriously injured in Afghanistan while serving with the Royal Marines He says at that time they experienced the Church as a healing and supportive community.

On March 18, Mr Chalmers led the sympathy after Dr Morrison announced his withdrawal as Moderator-Designate.

Dr Morrison said: "This has been a very painful decision but deep down I feel it is the right one. I am undergoing medical treatment and anticipate an operation ahead. The demanding role of Moderator requires someone to be operating on all cylinders. I do not have the necessary reserves just now.

My heartfelt prayers will be with all those on whom unexpected burdens now fall. May God's guidance, strength and peace be given to each one."

Mr Chalmers said: "We ask the whole Church to remember Angus and his family in their prayers and we hope that his health is fully restored in due course. I know that the General Assembly will be enormously sympathetic to Angus's position and will no doubt want him to fulfil the role of Moderator at some time in the future when he has made a full recovery."

A Church statement added that this was an unprecedented situation, but that the Committee to Nominate the Moderator 'has wide ranging powers to act in the event of such unforeseen circumstances'.

Games 2014 traffic management

Detailed plans for traffic management around venues in Glasgow during the Commonwealth Games have been revealed.

Temporary traffic management measures being brought in for the Games are intended to protect residents and business around venues from informal spectator to and from venues, ensuring that they arrive and exit events as quickly and as safely as possible.

To help residents and businesses with their planning a series of maps have been produced to provide a venue by venue guide of the traffic management and parking measures that will be in place in the run up to and during the Games.


