#### I had a dream...

I had a dream - well not quite. It was a nightmare. I dreamt that the church could not pay our ministers. Actually, it was not a dream. It is a possibility. At the moment, in order to pay our ministers the Church is drawing on its Reserves at startling rate. In a few years time the Reserves will have run out, and if the contributions from congregations to the Ministry Fund do not cover the payments to ministers for their salaries then the Church will become bankrupt. Then what? The prospect is horrifying.

Just how does this come about? The Church of Scotland has 964 ministers in parishes, according to the Church's Blue Book for the 2009 Assembly. The Church can only pay about 800 ministers without drawing on its Reserves. This means we have too many ministers.

What is the answer? We are t trying to raise more cash, but with a declining membership this will not cover the situation. We could reduce our ministers' stipends, but that is really unthinkable (or is it?) I suspect we will in due course see our ministerial manpower drop to around 800, and as that happens we will have to spread our ministerial resources more thinly on the ground.

I firmly believe that we do have a duty to "bring the ordinances or religion to the people of Scotland through a territorial ministry" as the Third Declaratory Article states, but that depends on resources available, and on how they are deployed.

According to plans drawn up by Presbyteries, there are 1,230 posts in Scotland eligible for a minister. These plans clearly constitute a wish list. They cannot be filled by our present numbers, and they will need to be revised. If we cannot afford the number of ministers we have at present, then Presbytery plans will have to be redrawn to give more realistic targets.

I hope the Church will have the wisdom and the courage to face this problem before it is too late.

#### **News from Shona Morrison**

It is tempting to say, "Remember Shona? The big sister of the two pipers?" But Shona is now a congregational 'personage' in her own right, as the following letter from her shows:-

"To set the scene I'm in India, sitting at a small desk in an orphanage that houses 80 children and several elderly people. I have just finished drinking a small in cup of India's national drink - chai. There was a big storm last night so the temperamental electricity has just been restored. There are noises of children playing outside, men chatting indoors and the fans whirring overhead.

"I had a fantastic time travelling around the north of the country. India is a real assault on the senses; sights, sounds and smells! It is also an extraordinary country, the colours, people, food, scenery, buildings, markets, roads... you get the idea. It is wonderful but it can be terrible at the same time. At times throughout my first month here the poverty I thought I had got used to would suddenly hit me lie a brick and fill me with questions about how people are being forced to live like this. My travels over the year exposed me to people f acing difficulties in many places and while it made me appreciate how lucky I am to have a chance to travel the world in this way I also felt the need to try and give something back. That's why I've ended up here, in a small village called Vellatur in Southern India. My days tend to include playing with the kids and teaching them English, working on the Mission's communication needs and trying to make them let me help with the cooking! "It is now a year since I set off from Glasgow Airport without much more than a backpack, a few pre-booked flights and no real plan of what on earth I was doing. I started off in the backpacker world centre - Bangkok in Thailand. Within a few hours I had ventured outside my hotel, was sitting on the kerb eating some noodle concoction from a roadside vendor and watching two elephants walk down the road!

"I had arranged a three week tour of Thailand to get me started and hopefully as a way of meeting more people. It took me all around the country and I got to experience some truly amazing sights and activities. Thailand was filled with lots of incredible temples, palaces, streets, foods, markets artwork, beaches, scenery and people. I could take up the whole of VISION with a list of the sights I was lucky enough to witness but it would be unfair to the other writers!



"I would like to give a mention of my favourite place though, a tribal village in the middle of the jungle in Chiang Mai. We had to trek through humid, overgrown, slippery rain forest for two days to get there but it was worth every uphill step! We stayed for two nights in a village where we got to visit the school, try our hand at 'rice pounding' and generally learn about their lives there. The village was completely self-sufficient, even growing their own cotton to make clothes and it really made me stop and think about how many 'things' we have and never use or even need at home. I fell in love with the place and got quickly used to the different way of life - bathing in the river, sleeping on floor mats etc., though eating a deep-fried cricket was more of a challenge! It was here that I first thought about volunteering, when we were helping to teach English to the school children. I thought what an honour it would be to help with something that is so easy for us but can make a real difference to them, and also to experience a completely different way of life in the rural part of a country."

#### **Absalom**

King David's children? What a pair!

First, his eldest on Amnon rapes his half-sister Tamar. Then, Tamar's brother Absalom in revenge kills Amnon. Fearful of David's wrath Absalom flees across Israel's northern border to Syria, and for three years lives there in exile.

King David in time grew 'consoled' concerning Amnon's death. His spirit longed to go to Absalom.

Joab, the king's commander-in-chief, knew how David was feeling and persuaded him to allow Absalom to return. Two years later there was a face-to-face reconciliation.

Happy ending? Far from it. Absalom, an ambitious and clever tactician, gathered around himself a band of followers, and ingratiated himself with many of the local folk, with the aim of proclaiming himself king. Now it was David's turn to flee.

War followed, At one point during the war Absalom was riding his mule under a big oak tree. His head (possibly his famously long hair) got caught. The mule carried on; Absalom was left hanging. When Joab heard of this he went and plunged three javelins into Absalom's heart.

Davis mourned for Absalom, even though his son had waged war against him to usurp the throne.

David's lament is poignant:

O my son Absalom! My son, my son Absalom! If only I had died instead of you - O Absalom, my son, my son!

There is a striking similarity between the story of David and Absalom and our own relationship with God. Like David who had a son whom he loved God had a people whom he loved. Absalom sinned and went onto exile; humanity sinned and went into darkness. David never stopped loving Absalom; God never stopped loving his people.

David lamented, "If only I had died instead of you"; God's reaction was not an "if only..."; God's own son Jesus died instead of Israel - to redeem not only them but us too!

## Dan "... from Dan to Beersheba ..."

HERE we now say "from John o' Groats to Land's End" meaning everything in the Great Britain from the northern to the southern extremities. So in the Bible we find "from Dan to Beersheba", meaning everything in Israel from the north to the south.

When Joshua cast lots to determine where the various tribes should settle when they reached the Promised Land, the Danites were allotted an area just north west of the Dead Sea. Jacob's blessing had likened Dan to a viper (Genesis) and a lion's cub (Deuteronomy) but despite their imputed aggressive character the Danites were unable to hold on to their land under pressure from their alien neighbours and the majority migrated north, further north even than the Sea of Galilee, and settled to a new home near the source of the River Jordan. This they called 'Dan', after their forebear. They remained there until deported by Tiglath-pileser.

Further south the Danite minority, who had remained near some of the other tribal territories, had as their neighbours the hostile Philistines. Here was where Samson, a Danite and the last of the Judges, was a real thorn in their flesh. He could be described as a 'big thicky', as the stories of his exploits show. His legendary strength, his sensual passions and his hotheadedness led him to wreak havoc among the Philistines, and eventually to go to own death in Gaza.

The Canaanite Dan was eventually absorbed into Judah, and there is no trace of it in modern atlases.
