

Really this message comes from Israel, and brings greetings and best wishes from our Mission Partner Colin Johnston and the congregation of St Andrew's Church of Scotland at Tiberias, whom we visited on holiday last month.

We shared in worship in Tiberias our first Sunday and then finished our holiday by worshipping with those who gather in the Scots Church (again St Andrew's) in Jerusalem. In between we visited Akko, Capernaum, Jericho, the "other side" of the Sea of Galilee as well as getting close to the borders of Lebanon, Syria and Jordan as we travelled through the Golan Heights. Alas Bethlehem and Nazareth will have to await a return visit, but we also explored the Old City and museums of Jerusalem itself.

We saw ancient Biblical sights like the ruined city of Dan, the place Abraham first entered the holy land; and more challenging modern ones like the "peace wall" which divides Israel and the West Bank Palestinian territories.

Always the question of peace and reconciliation between the different peoples and faiths of the land was to the fore and it is one of the roles of the church and Christian community to help be a bringer of peace.

It is too early to say what made the strongest impression on me, except the unfailing courtesy of all whom we met particularly those who work in the church centres, hotel and guesthouse.

Would I go back? Yes.

Would you come with me? If enough say yes, it could be arranged.

James (Jim) Telfer. - 6th April 1924 - 6th October 2010

Jim was born on 6th April 1924 in the family home in South Street in Whiteinch. He was the eldest of three sons born to Lilias and William Telfer. Educated at Hyndland School, at 15 he went to work as a junior clerk in the offices of a flour importers. At 16 he began an apprenticeship with Rowans the engine makers and this began his life long link with shipbuilding and ships. When he was 19, with three years of his apprenticeship completed, he joined the Royal Navy and served for an eventful 4 years. Back ashore he worked for Rowans, John Browns, Upper Clyde Shipbuilders (being the last one to leave because worked for the Liquidators) and Howden's.

Outside his family his two major commitments were the Boys Brigade, he was a captain for over 50 years, and as Church Elder of 65 years service. Jim was until recently the Roll Keeper at Pollokshields Church, diligently keeping track of everyone's movements and keeping in touch with them. As roll keeper Jim meticulously set out the communion cards for the elders prior to their communion visits.

Jim was a magpie, collecting all kinds of material from bare wood to vacuum cleaners including en passant an Eskimo Harpoon. From this rich treasuretrove he could produce just what was needed to put a handle on a door or a handle on a knife. He could turn his hand to almost anything, a new key for a lock, door keeps or mortices.

It is as a friend and mentor of so many boys, a visiting Elder par excellence, a good neighbour to so many, that he will be missed. The BB Hymn asks, 'Will your anchor hold?' In his own way Jim was an anchor to many.

Our prayers are with Isabel, James and Joan also their families.

Pruning The Minister

Wise men from the East have decreed that the Presbytery of Glasgow has to prepare a plan for the Church in Glasgow in which we lose 31 posts for ministers of work and sacrament. At present there are 163 such posts. Since there are only 143 congregations, as at 31st December 2008, it should not be too difficult to lose about 20 posts. The difficult problem is that Glasgow is such a varied community.

To begin with there are 35 congregations whose income is more that £100k per year. Together their incomes came to over £5,000,000, or about 51% of the income of Glasgow Presbytery. They are obviously carrying the Presbytery and to disrupt them would be stupid. Killing the goose that lays the golden egg, comes to mind.

There are 60 congregations whose income is below \pounds 50k per year. They include 38 urban priority area parishes. Together, their incomes come to about \pounds 1,600,000 or 15% of the income of Glasgow Presbytery. As a group, their membership do not seem to be responding to the Message, even though the Church is putting in extra resources. Scattering seeds on stony ground comes to mind.

The 38 priority area congregations are given extra resources to help them, but it does not seem to bring results. In the next few months when the Presbytery Plan is under discussion the remaining 48 congregations are going to be put under considerable pressure.


I wonder how the wise men of the inner councils of the Presbytery of Glasgow will decide how to prune the Ministry.

Prayer Support Network

The prayer support network was set up to give people a way of requesting

prayers for individuals or situations that were important to members of the congregation. Prayer requests can be made using the prayer cards that are on the pews, or via the church web site. The co-ordinator then passes on the requests only to the people in the support network who include them in their own daily prayers.



The requests can be as detailed or as vague as people like as God knows what we are asking for and who it's for. Your requests can last for a set period of time or they can last indefinitely just indicate on your prayer request.

Little People who have made a big Impression Paul's Nephew

The job of the Roman Commander in charge of the occupation force in Jerusalem was clear - it was simply to snuff our immediately any hint of trouble before it could damage the fragile peace the Roman army was there to enforce.

Acts records one incident, though. A Pentecost Paul was in the temple taking part in a Jewish ritual. He was recognised by some Jews from Asia, who had heard him preaching Christianity. They dragged him from the temple, raised an uproar and started beating him. They were about to kill him when the Roman Commander intervened and arrested him le took him to the Roman Army barracks.

The Commander was unable to find out the substance of the Jews' complaint. He decided to transfer the case to Caesarea where Governor Felix could hear Paul and his accusers. Now some of the Jewish extremists plotted to assassinate Paul as he was in transit.

Enter a hero, Paul 's nephew, who had heard of the plot. He told Paul of it, who arranged for him to explain the danger to the Commander. The latter, rightly understanding the situation, with its possibility of serious trouble, sent with Paul an escort of 200 soldiers, 70 horsemen and 200 spearmen.

The young man was courageous, in being an intermediary between Jews and Romans, and an interview with a senior 'enemy' officer must have been nerve wracking, but by doing what he did saved Paul's life.

The young man was one of "little people who made a big impression". By his one small action, carrying a vital message, he is still remembered 2,000 years later.

On 11th October, the Guild invited along to their meeting the Miss Eleanor McMahon, an Interim Minister to speak about A Place for Hope. This is one of the six Church of Scotland Guild projects which our Guild is supporting. It was felt that this was an important topic so the Kirk Session and Congregation were invited to attend the meeting.

The Ministries Council and the Guild hope to establish an Ecumenical Centre for reconciliation and peacemaking. It is hoped that this will help people address conflict within the Church and beyond.

Miss McMahon explained an Interim Minister goes into different Churches, like if there is a vacancy or if there is a disagreement. They may be there for a few months or a few years depending on the situation. She also explained to us how conflict can affect us all.

She started the meeting by asking us to pair off and then to arm wrestle each other which was an odd way to start a meeting but fun.

To give us an example of conflict she asked Marjory and Sadie to take part in a sketch. She had one orange and both Marjory and Sadie wanted it. They would not let the other get the orange nor would each of them accept half an orange.

She then asked what they needed the orange for. Sadie said she needed the juice of one orange for a cake she wished to bake. Marjory said she needed the rind of one orange for her cake.



So the answer was simple by talking to each other they could both get what they needed.

Sometimes this is all it

takes to sort a situation out but people usually get possessive, believe they are right and won't listen to reason.
