One of the enjoyable parts of church life is the regular visits we have from pupils from the local Primary Schools. They always have lots of questions about the church building and about the Christian faith and what we believe.

It made me pause to realise this child had grasped what so many of us fail to hold on to at Easter, that the story doesn't end there but continues to this very day and moment – for the dying Saviour of Good Friday, the risen Christ of Easter Sunday is also the one who will return to claim his kingdom "on earth as it is in Heaven".

Another child asked about what prayers we say in church, reminding me that following the success of our Lent Study Group – almost 30 people attended over the course of the six weeks – our next discussion series will be focused on the Lord's Prayer.

Before that we will be welcoming new members both through baptism and confirmation and anyone who wishes can join a group looking at the vows of church membership which will take place after Easter (contact myself for further details).

As we noted at the Annual Stated Meeting, though we face challenges, not least financially, spiritually we are

in good heart, learning and worshipping together, seeking to play our part in building Christ's kingdom here on earth until that day comes when He will return and claim it and redeem it as His own.

The walks highlight key buildings, features, details and notable former residents. The Trail leaflets will guide people through the leafy avenues and handsome tenement lined streets of Pollokshields.


The third leaflet is a splendid guide to the story of Pollokshields – Glasgow's Garden Suburb. It celebrates the Maxwell family - the landowners who had the vision for a grand garden suburb to the south of the city centre and then saw it through three generations of the family, the master planners the family employed to draw up their vision, the developers who invested in the suburb and the architects whose designs they commissioned. It also celebrates those who then built the buildings and the craftsmen and artisans who forged the details that still delight us today.

Pollokshields Heritage hosted the official launch of the leaflets on Sunday 3rd March 2013 at Pollokshields Burgh Hall with a guided walk through the Avenues leaving from the Burgh Halls at 2.00pm and followed by afternoon tea from 3 to 4.30pm at the Burgh Hall.





Plans and Developments

Two items reported on at The Annual Stated Meeting are the Presbytery Plan and the progress of our own Development Plans.

The Presbytery of Glasgow have given us a place in their plan for the next ten years which is to have an unrestricted ministry post serving our current parish community (in other words no change to our present situation). However changes are being made to the congregations around us at Kinning Park, Govanhill and Shawlands.

This lifts one element of uncertainty from us, and we hope our Business Plan, funded from our Feasibility Study Grant from the General Trustees will also help us build for the future. We await a return visit from the Trustees to see what the next stage in our planning for the use of Church House ought to be.

Meanwhile the development group are implementing some of the suggestions made so that we can make more effective use of the space we have – hence the re naming of rooms and new advertising to draw in more "lets".



The Event at St George's Tron

This last week has been, ecclesiastically, some week



First we had the enthronement of Pope Francis in Rome. Then we had the enthronement of the new Archbishop of Canterbury. But most important of all was the Induction of the Rev Alastair Duncan as the Transition Minister of St George's Tron, Church of Scotland.

As you will all know, the former Minister and most of the Congregation left the Church on 12th June 2012, and St George's Tron has been vacant since then. On 12th February 2013, Alastair Duncan, Minister of Garelochhead church answered the call, and on Wednesday, 20th March 2013 he was Inducted.

A number of us from Pollokshields were there. It was a lovely service. There were three former Moderators of the General Assembly present as well as 84 members of Glasgow Presbytery and over 200 others. The Church was full, and as you may imagine, the singing was tremendous.

St George's Tron is a very fine church, very plain but looking very elegant. The only thing I did not like was the pulpit. It seemed as though the preacher was very high up and was talking down to us. An Induction Service is just an ordinary service, with hymns, prayers, Bible readings and a sermon. The Induction is a serious and solemn part where the new Minister has to answer nine very deep and searching questions, and then he has to sign a statutory Formula. The Moderator of the Presbytery then Inducts him by Prayer. That done, all 84 members of the Presbytery file out and offer him the Right Hand of Fellowship.

The final procedure is that the Moderator, The Rev Howard Hudson, then addresses charges to the new Minister. As one wag put it, at an Induction Service you get two sermons for your money.

Afterwards, there was the usual tea, coffee and buns. As there is no Congregation left in St George's Tron, this was supplied by the members of Mr Duncan's former church of Garelochhead. They deserve a big thanks for their efforts. As he has no official congregation yet, Mr Duncan would be very glad to see at his services any members of Pollokshields Church, and I am sure we will not be disloyal to our own church if we drop into St George's Tron to any of the services.

Ministers

Since the High Kirk began almost one and three quarter centuries ago, generations of Christians have worshipped and served here. In all of that time, however, there have only been 10 ministers. Some of these ministers only served at the High for a few years, although they made huge contributions to the life of the High Kirk.

For example, the first minister, the Rev Thomas Burns who was instrumental in founding the High, and the second minister the Rev Robert Stirrat who steered the congregation through the first difficult years after the Disruption.


Bookworms

The Good Morning Service

Good Morning is a free telephone alert and befriending service. Good Morning are interested in older people; their lives, values, beliefs – what makes them *them*.

Over time Befrienders become a "good friend on the phone", there to listen and give emotional support through difficult times.

Good Morning alert to potential health problems at an early stage. When repeated calls go unanswered they will liaise with local services in an attempt to locate the person and verify their safety. Health appointments are checked. If the person cannot be found, a nominated contact person or local police are alerted. This makes members feel safer and are more confident in living alone knowing that help will be sent if they need it.
